## A guide to formatting your paper

### Why MLA?

The short answer: Your professor chose it.

The long answer: MLA format is likely the default format of any upper academic essay. Aside from the sciences, MLA format serves as a useful format to cover a range of subjects. It features the key elements within its format that make essays easier to read and information easier to find.

#### Before you begin writing:

#### **General Formatting:**

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

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

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### The Heading:

Your cursor should be aligned to the upper left hand side.

First, type your first and last name.

Press Enter.

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Type the title of the course the essay is for with the class number if applicable.

Press Enter.

Type the date the assignment is due in the format Day Month Year.

Press Enter.

See Figure 4 for an example heading.

#### The Title:

Your cursoso

Select the left aligned line icon to return the cursor to the left side.

Type or copy/paste your first citation into the paper.

Once your citation(s) have been typed, highlight *all* the citations. Do *not* highlight the Works Cited heading.
